Interim MWIF President's Report

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest`` (Matt 11:28

This past year as your Interim President has been one of missed opportunities to connect with one another due to the Global Pandemic. The New Year began with such promise as we planned our Great Canadian Bible Study, only to find on waking that morning that a snowstorm made it impossible for us to gather together. As time went on into Easter, we could not gather with our loved ones, say our goodbyes, be with our loved ones in hospital.

We could not hug and kiss our loved ones, and our connection to our church family was severed for many of our elderly members, and those who had no connection to technology. There were no in person services at Easter, and it became clear to many that their vacation plans, and travel to see

family was not to be. Women in Focus continued to connect but it was evident that our Fall Gathering would not be possible. We held each other up in prayer and prayed for God's guidance and will in our lives as we rested on his promises.

We had hopes that if we social distanced, wore masks, washed our hands and sanitized surely by summer it would be gone - but - as we opened up and enjoyed God's creation it was difficult to maintain social distance and to wear masks and limit gatherings. The virus has again surged. We find we are again limited in our social inter-action, working at home, home schooling for some, in person church services again cancelled, wondering if we will ever again be back to our lives - and we grow weary - but we continue as women to keep the faith and continue to make ways for us to connect, inspire and give hope and spiritual nourishment to our sisters and brothers in Christ.

Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up. (Galatians 6:9)

"No one sews a patch of unshrunk cloth on an old garment, it will pull away from the garment and make the tear worse." Neither do men pour new wine into old wineskins. If they do the skins will burst. No they pour the new wine into new wine skins and both are preserved" (Matt 9:16-17)

Women are the connecting threads of our social fabric – both within our families and our church family. He is making a new creation and renewing others. We may not be able to go back to the old norms – but we are creating new ways to connect, to be together to support one another. We are learning new songs to sing in Zion, hearing and reading God's word spoken to us in giving us hope and a vision of a new and better future. As we navigate our new normal, he gives us hope in the "dark winters of life."

I know sometimes in these "dark days" I forget to look at the miracles that surround me in my family, my church family and my work. It has been stressful, with the drug overdoses, suicides, and relapses – but there are so many successes in the lives of these women who face insurmountable barriers. For instance one woman has been cleared for a liver transplant and there are two possible donors.

No matter what the future holds, at the end of this tunnel He is our shining a light. With the pouring of the new wine in new wineskins – both will be preserved – the new and the old. He is creating a new reality while preserving the old. He is creating opportunities to mend the old. I have faith in his promise that he purposes only good for those who love him. WIF is continuing to embrace the new reality, while continuing to find new and creative ways of connecting, serving and ministering to one another in Christ –our Hope in ages past and today. 

Muriel Mears January 8, 2020

She was also an active member of Broadway-First Baptist Church and joyfully sang for many years in the choir. She was part of the Women's Christian Fellowship and helped out with many church dinners and funeral receptions.

<u>Eileen Pound</u> April 26, 2020 at the age of 97.

Eileen was a faithful member of Broadway for over 70 years and belonged to many Women's circles and groups. She received the Western Life and Dominion Life membership pins for her leadership and work in the groups. She taught Sunday school and, along with her husband, raised three girls.

She organized many dinners, including the Ex-Offenders dinners. Edna also sang soprano in the choir for as many years as I can remember. She served as a deacon for a number of years as well. She volunteered with the Community Clothesline Ministry at Broadway.

UKRAINIAN EVANGELICAL BAPTIST CHURCH

Nina Tereshchenko was born on August 30, 1946 in Ukraine. She was the eldest daughter in the family. From the age of 5, she began to help parents manage the household and take care of their younger children. At the age of 18 she entered an agricultural technical school and became a livestock specialist. In 1966 she married and gave birth to three children. In 1998 she was widowed. All her life she lived in the village and worked in animal husbandry. In 2009 she came to Winnipeg for her grandson's wedding. Here she heard the truth about the Lord, repented and received Holy Water Baptism in the Ukrainian Evangelical Church on June 27, 2009. For 11 years Nina served in a prayer ministry and was responsible for the library. She constantly prayed for the salvation of her large family and told everyone she could about the Lord. MISSION PROJECTS FOR 2020

Peggi Talbot explained the Bolivian project being led by Kallie and Tim Hutton CBM field workers. A CBM Video called "On Eagles Wings" was presented showing the work that is being done at the Casa de la Amistad project and how grateful the Bolivian women are to learn a life skill in sewing and be able to provide for their family. The Bolivian women are raising funds to sustain their project and CBM is asking WIF to raise \$8000. which would be a 4:1 match to show our support and encouragement to these women. The total commitment to the Casa Project from CBM in 2019 is \$70.050 There is an opportunity to go to Bolivia and serve in this project and at the same time attend the Baptist World Alliance Women's Conference in Brazil in July 2020.

OFFICERS 2018-2020

Colleen Allan called for nominations for the position of Secretary and Treasurer. Rerie Resendes has stepped down as acting treasurer due to health reasons.

SECRETARY Rerie Resendes (FEC) nominated Peggi Talbot (B-FBC) who has been acting Secretary to the position for 2019-2020. Janet Buhler seconded. All in favor. **Carried**.

TREASURER Sol Quizan (FEC) nominated Charlene McAlpin (Cornerstone) to the position as Treasurer for 2019-2020. Colleen Allan seconded. All in favor. **Carried**.

The list of MWIF executive positions as listed in the docket remain the same until 2020.

LUNCH

Carol Parsons gave the grace for the food and also prayed for Arlene Milton from Flin Flon who is not well as reported by Carol Seburn. A delicious lunch with soups, sandwiches, salad and desserts was served by the Cornerstone women. It was a great time to mingle and meet others from different churches and share. Door prizes of books from Lyndi Needham and Miranda Ward and CDs from the music ministry "The Stone" at Cornerstone were handed out.

WORSHIP and MEDITATION

After lunch, the women were led in Praise and Worship by Rhonda and Charlene singing "How Great is Our God".

Colleen Allan introduced out guest speaker, Charlene McAlpin who spoke on Psalm 1 "Living on the Promises of God" She said we should all "marinate" on the word of God and His promises. "If you marinate on the Word, your fruit will prosper and you will find joy." Charlene closed with prayer.

SHARING MINISTRIES

Colleen Allan had the women look at the reports from the churches (10) listed in the docket and they were accepted.

MISSION CHURCH UPDATES

Lesia Andrusyshyn reported on the **Ukrainian Evangelical Baptist Church** activities and their annual family camp at Camp Arnes in September. Their fellowship provides opportunity for newcomers from the Ukraine and elsewhere to be part of a Christian community as they adjust to a Canadian lifestyle. With members coming and moving on, their membership fluctuates but is a blessing to many and also to their online ministry that is broadcast around the world.

Karin Regehr spoke on behalf of **Bethlehem Aboriginal Fellowship** that share space with Living Word Temple on Manitoba Avenue. Even though they are without a pastor, many of our CBWC pastors offer to preach for them in the afternoon. Jo-Anne Swenson, a very active leader for many years, is missed since her passing. She was a great blessing to BAF. Karin is starting up a ladies' bible study this fall and the men meet bi-weekly at Robin's Donut for study and fellowship.

As Elizabeth Kibwaa could not attend, Peggi Talbot reported on **Faith Evangelical Mission Church.** They continue to meet at Knox United downtown in the chapel for worship every Sunday with mid week prayer meeting and fellowship. Newcomers to Canada from Africa are assisted in adapting to a new life in a Christian environment. A recent baptism at Bird's Hill in the lake by a young adult was a blessing to the group. They have many picnics in the summer at Kildonan Park.

The Board Report

Hello Folks! It's been a long time since you've heard from us. But despite COVID, the church closing for a time and not having the technology to keep in touch with one another, the Lord has been at work in our church in some exciting ways.

After our dear friend, mentor and prayer warrior Jo-Ann Swenson died last summer, the Board began seeking the Lord on what He wanted for the future of Bethlehem. We set up a "What is the Future of BAF Committee" comprised of Karin Regher, Jeremy Zehr, Alan Edward and myself; all of us attenders at BAF. What we thought would be about 4 meetings turned into a nine-month journey.

We started out seeking input from our congregation. What was important to them about BAF? If we closed, how would that affect them? If we stayed open, what would they like to see changed? Then the committee set about looking at their answers, seeking the Lord for scripture and examined where we were at as a church. Throughout many meetings, we considered all possibilities. We gathered together to seek the Lord on each option with an individual prayer time first, then coming together to share.

At the beginning of each meeting each of us spent time relinquishing what we wanted and also what we didn't want in order to hear what the Lord wanted. This was a very important part of the process and not always an easy one. Page 10

In time, unanimously we felt the Lord wanted us to stay open. From a human viewpoint, this seemed a silly decision as we are so small. But we weren't responding to a human viewpoint. Then the process began of what we were to look like, what needed to change if we stayed open? Again, after much relinquishing and prayer we unanimously felt the Lord was leading us to hire a part time pastor. But who? For the last 7 years we had wanted to hire a pastor but had more or less given up as we couldn't find anyone for the position.

Then, somewhat like our eyes were opened, one of our own came into view. He has quietly attended the church for years, has some training, has volunteer pastored at some Main Street mission churches as well as some others and has preached for us a few times. Most of us did not know him very well. After a series of interviews where he shared about his life and how recently he felt the Lord was prompting him to something new but didn't know what, we invited him to be our pastor for 10 hours a week. (all we can afford at this time), conditional on the congregations' approval. The church family agreed with this suggestion with much handclapping and hollering!

Lyle Blackbird is indigenous, (our congregation expressed the desire for more indigenous leadership), spent some years growing up in Winnipeg's North End and experienced some turbulent times in his boyhood. He understands the pain and brokenness of the people in our community. He is able to contextualize this in his sermons and in caring for our people. We are excited to have him as our pastor, even though it is just for 10 hours a week. His main job will be to preach on Sundays so that we have continuity. But he has a huge heart for outreach so we will see where the Lord leads us with that. We have much for which to thank the Lord!

Meet Lyle Blackbird, Our New Pastor

Here is a brief interview with Lyle:

Tell us a bit about your childhood:

I grew up in the North and West ends of Winnipeg which included a CFS group home for a few years. I often went to the reserve in summertime to be with my grandparents as it was a safe place. My mother was a residential school survivor. She had struggles with alcoholism and led a dysfunctional life that was the residue of that "legacy". That sometimes made home life chaotic with its violence and alcohol.

How did you become a believer?:

My fiancé started to go back to church and invited me. I went out of curiosity. By then I was struggling with alcohol and wanted to stop. I asked the minister to pray for me to stop which he did. A few months later I realized something had happened but I couldn't explain it. The desire to drink was totally gone. It got my attention that the Lord would touch me in this way. That drew me to continue attending church at the Indian Metis Pentecostal Church on Main St and I slowly got into the church culture. Page 11

How did life change?:

I began to teach Sunday school, helped out with Bible Studies and filled in when the pastor wasn't there. Then I became an assistant pastor. So I started to preach when I was 30 years old at various churches. Now I am 56. I got married to Nancy and had a family. We have 2 grown boys, 3 teenage daughters and 2 grandsons. I was drawn to ministry but struggled with that because I often felt that ministers were cut from a different bolt of cloth than the rest of us. I thought I wasn't good enough for that. I also had a full time job so had to work at balancing that with full time ministry.

How did you end up at BAF?:

A number of years ago we moved close by the church and I started to attend. Four years ago I started assisting with the men's Bible study at BAF and gradually took it over. In the last year or so I have been a guest preacher on Sundays as well.

Lately I'd felt a strong push from the Lord to be in ministry with the people from the neighbourhood but I didn't know where or when. Then I got a call asking if I'd be interested in the part time pastor position at BAF. About the same time, we found out we had to move – in 3 weeks. I prayed that if God wanted me in this position then he would open up a place for us to live in the neighbourhood as I felt that was really important. Three weeks later we moved into a really nice apartment in the neighbourhood! After talking a few times with the committee, we felt this is where I was to be.

What now?:

It's been 3 months since I started and it has been a very positive and supportive environment. But it is also heart breaking because of the condition of the community. There are a lot of addictions, drugs and poverty and everything that goes along with that lifestyle, not the least being how it humiliates people. My dream for the church would be that we all become full participants of the gospel in serving our neighbourhood.
